


# Bus ads tout cross-border cures: U.S. firm lures patients south

WATERLOO REGION -Patients tired of waiting for knee surgery may find an alternative on the back of a bus

Advertisements are appearing on Grand River Transit buses for a U.S. company called MediBid, which offers bids for medical services in the United States and overseas, including speedy knee-replacement surgery. Calling itself "the





"They would have immediate access. We don't have a wait list," Clifton said. "What we offer is the choice and access."

The company opened to U.S. patients in January, and Canadian

patients at the beginning of June, when an advertising campaign began in a small number of Ontario cities.

To get a bid, patients pay a membership fee. For one procedure request, patients pay \$25. Or there are packages for a certain number of requests over six or 12 months, with the most expensive at \$99 for 12 requests in a year.

Doctors and medical facilities pay fees to use the service, too.

People create a profile and post a request for care, such as a consultation, surgery, a new form of cancer therapy or even an annual checkup. Then the patient gets a list of practitioners, including their location and credentials, to pick from. The patient then asks certain doctors for a cash-price quote. When the patient accepts a bid, the rest is arranged between the two.

Potentially, a person could get knee surgery right away.

"Of course it's not right for everybody," Clifton said.

The average price for knee-replacement surgery in the United States is \$12,000, she said.

Payments are arranged between a patient and the doctor, and most likely are not eligible for government reimbursement.

Securing out-of-country funding from the provincial Ministry of Health is a rigid process, said spokesperson Andrew Morrison, and "it all hinges on prior approval."

Patients need to apply, usually through their doctor, before getting the services, and five criteria must be met for provincial funding.

Among the criteria: the service is not performed in Ontario or, if it is offered here, it must be needed more quickly to avoid death or significant irreversible tissue damage. The procedure needs to be done at a hospital or licensed health facility, it cannot be part of a trial or experimental study, and it must be accepted as medical practice in Ontario.

Wait times for knee-replacement surgery in Ontario are reasonably low and far better now than a few years ago. When the province started to focus on reducing medical wait times in 2007, Morrison said, the average wait for knee-replacement surgery was 321 days. This year the average wait is down to 176 days, just under six months and below the target of 182 deemed by doctors to be a reasonable period.

"We're doing well," Morrison said.

Locally, the wait times for knee surgery are even better. Grand River Hospital is among the best hospitals in the province when it comes to the shortest wait time for knee-replacement surgery. The Kitchener hospital's wait time was 77 days between March and May this year, compared to 106 for the Waterloo Wellington Local Health Integration Network.

"We're pretty pleased with the reduction in wait times here," said Sandra Hanmer, chief executive officer of the Waterloo Wellington Local Health Integration Network.

She said there may still be the perception the wait is long for knee surgery because only a few years ago it was much longer. Across the province, the wait has been cut by 255 days in the past decade. As part of the province's wait time strategy, current wait times for a host of medical services are posted on their website www.health.gov.on.ca.

Hanmer said people should have a choice about where to get medical care, but making sure services are available here within a reasonable time is their priority.

"Our focus will always be on trying to improve local access."

Of course, some people don't want to wait.

The Health Ministry doesn't track companies offering out-of-country service to Ontario residents, Morrison said, but they do pop up regularly. The province does have agreements with U.S. facilities for certain treatments where a lower high-volume price is negotiated, such as for a certain cancer treatment, diagnostic imaging, residential addiction treatment and bariatric surgery.
